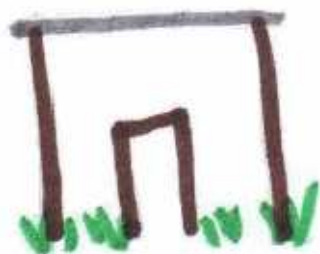

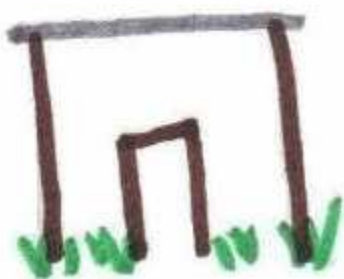


Book One

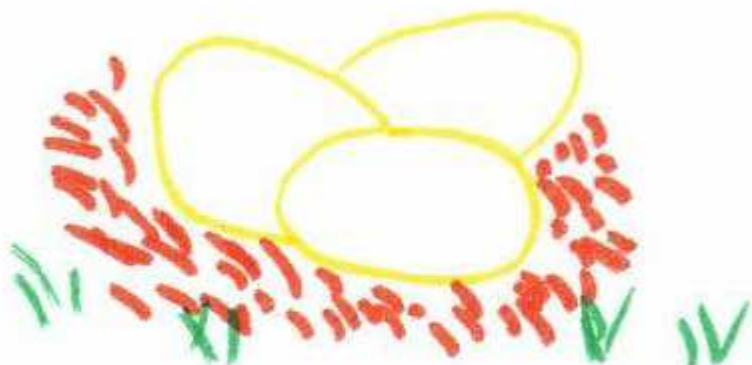

In English we say **God** created,  
but in Hebrew land  
they simply say **created** **God**,  
but we can understand!

They mean exactly what we say,  
though it may seem quite strange.  
The meaning always is the same—  
just order seems to change.

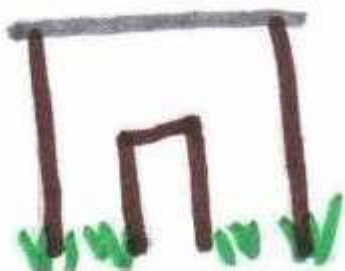

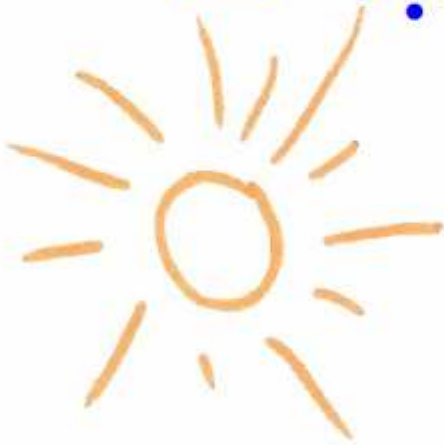

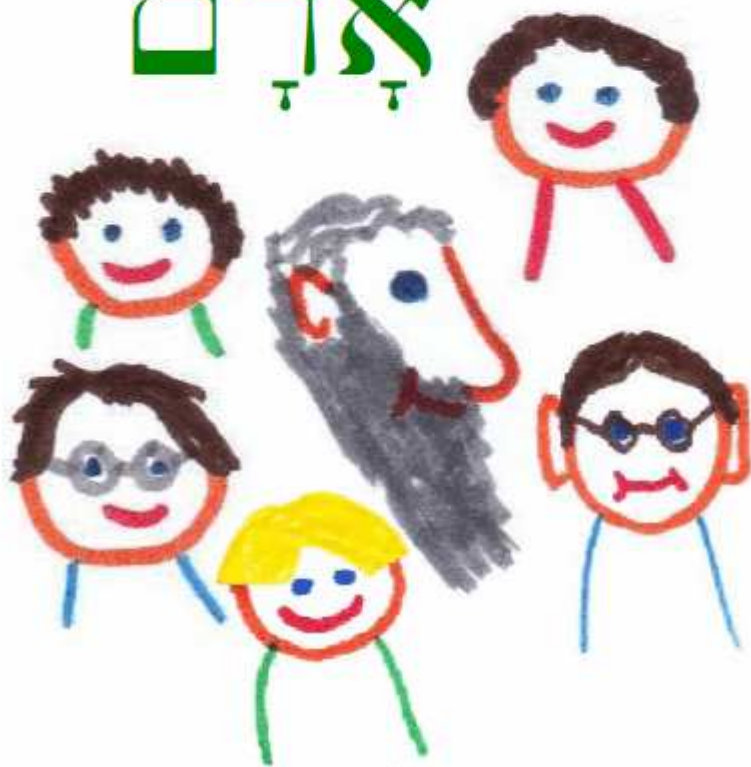
